

Medicaid Coverage of Medications for the Treatment of Opioid Use Disorder

In New Jersey between 2008-2012, persons enrolled in substance use treatment programs that

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prescribed methadone **increased 1.5%**. In 2012 in New Jersey, **25.2%** of persons aged 12 and older who met criteria for having a drug use disorder received treatment^{α}.

State Benefits at a Glance^{β}...

Methadone

New Jersey Medicaid covers methadone under Fee-For-Service (FFS) plans. In order to receive coverage for methadone for the treatment of opioid use disorder, federal law mandates that patients are enrolled in, or have documented proof of, substance use disorder (SUD) counseling.

Buprenorphine/Naloxone film (Suboxone ®), Buprenorphine/Naloxone tablets (generic),

Buprenorphine/Naloxone tablets (Zubsolv ^{®c}) and Buprenorphine tablets (generic).

Medication Limitations

New Jersey Medicaid covers Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets under FFS plans with the following limitations:

- Patients <u>do not need to be enrolled in</u>, or have documented proof of, SUD* counseling in order to be treated with Suboxone for opioid use disorder. Data for other forms of Buprenorphine was not reported.
- Buprenorphine dosage is limited to 32mg/day after an initial 6-month treatment period.
- No information was provided for Zubsolv.

It was not reported if these medications require prior authorization for use, if they appear on New Jersey's preferred drug list, or if they are covered in physician's offices or organized specialty outpatient treatment programs (OTPs) under FFS or Managed Care (MC) plans.

Injectable Naltrexone (VIVITROL[®])

As of 2013, New Jersey Medicaid <u>did not cover</u> Vivitrol for the treatment of opioid use disorder.

As of June 2013, New Jersey Medicaid was planning to implement treatment with Vivitrol.
