

Medicaid Coverage of Medications for the Treatment of Opioid Use Disorder

In West Virginia between 2008-2012, persons enrolled in

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substance use treatment programs that prescribed methadone **increased 11.8%**. In 2012 in West Virginia, **16.5%** of persons aged 12 and older who met criteria for having a drug use disorder received treatment^{α}.

State Benefits at a Glance^{β}...

Methadone

West Virginia Medicaid does not cover methadone.

Buprenorphine/Naloxone film (Suboxone ®), Buprenorphine/Naloxone tablets (generic),

Buprenorphine/Naloxone tablets (Zubsolv ^{®c}) and Buprenorphine tablets (generic).

Medication Limitations

West Virginia Medicaid covers Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets, under FFS plans, with the following limitations:

- In order to approve Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets, patients <u>must be</u> <u>enrolled in</u>, or have documented proof of, SUD* counseling.
- Treatment using Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets is <u>limited 16mg/daily</u> <u>after a 6-month treatment period</u>.
- These medications <u>require prior authorization</u> for use.
- No information was provided for Zubsolv.

West Virginia covers Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets as a pharmacy benefit under both FFS and managed care plans.

Only Suboxone is listed on West Virginia's preferred drug list for FFS plans. Suboxone, buprenorphine/naloxone tablets, and buprenorphine tablets are covered in physician's offices, under FFS plans.



State Benefits at a Glance (continued)...

Injectable Naltrexone (VIVITROL[®])

West Virginia Medicaid covers injectable naltrexone (Vivitrol[®]) under FFS plans. Patients **must** be enrolled in, or have documented proof of, SUD* counseling for Vivitrol coverage.

- Vivitrol is covered as a pharmacy benefit under FFS plans.
- <u>Prior authorization</u> is required for use.

Vivitrol is covered for use in physician's offices under FFS plans.

^c Zubsolv was not included in the original survey, as the medication was not FDA approved until fall of 2013.
