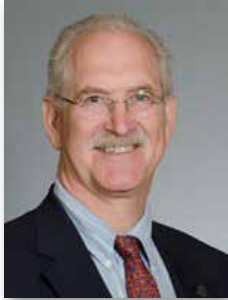

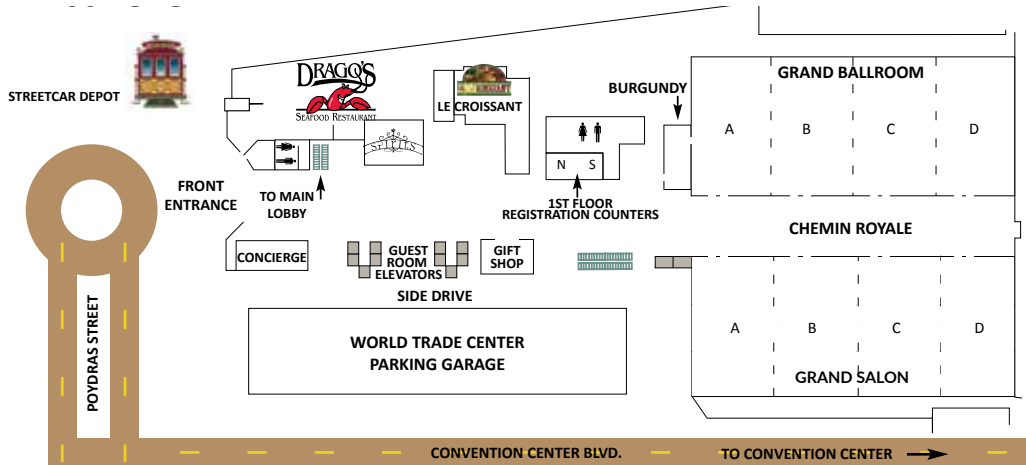

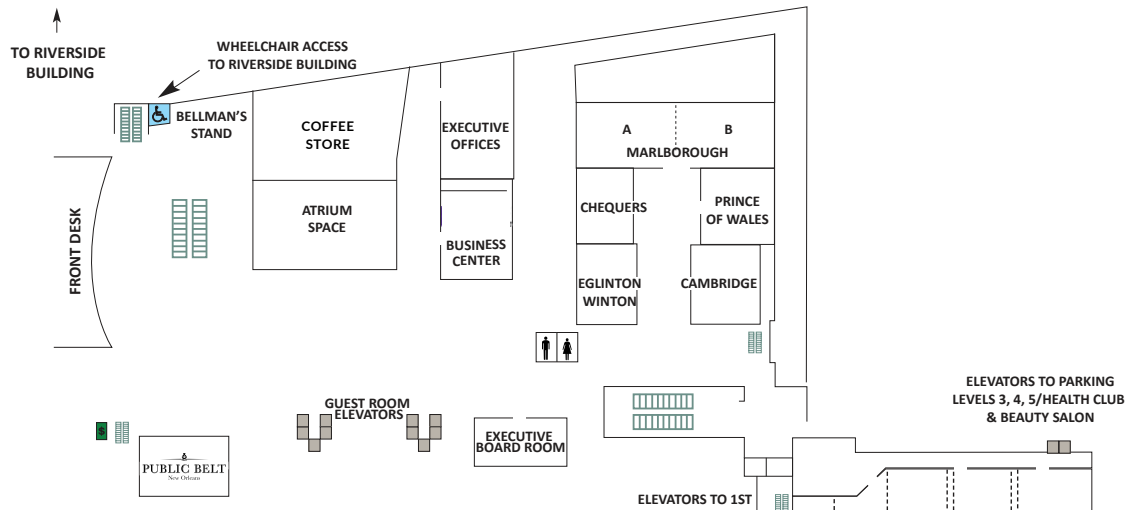
Hotel Floorplan



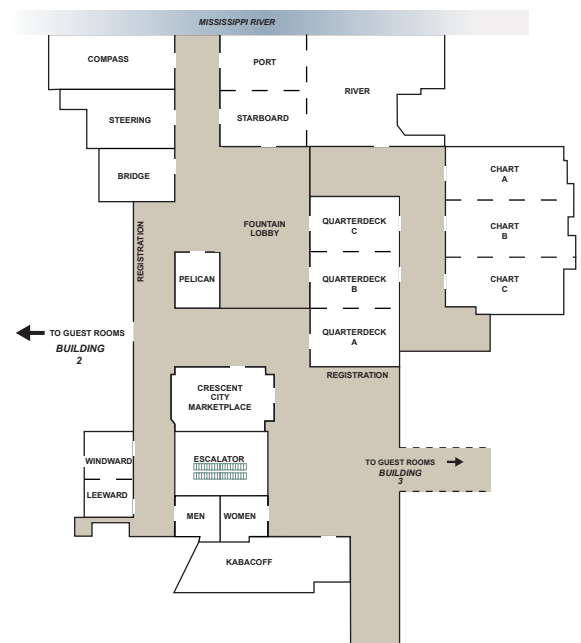
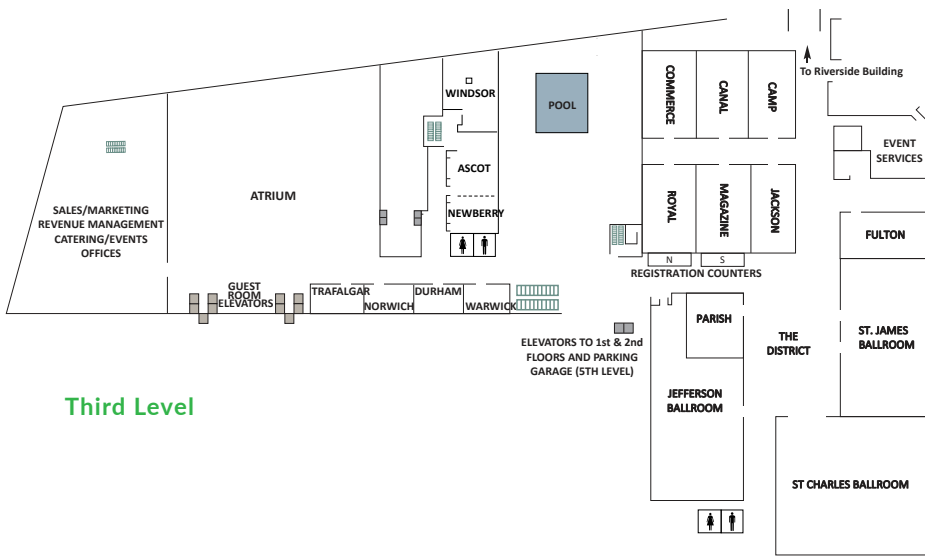

Professionalism	Representing yourself, your organization, and the field in a professional, health-oriented, responsible, and proactive manner, to reduce substance-related harm, promote health, and address stigma.	
Systems Integration	Address challenges with accessing or navigating complex healthcare/healthcare-related systems needed to improve patient care.

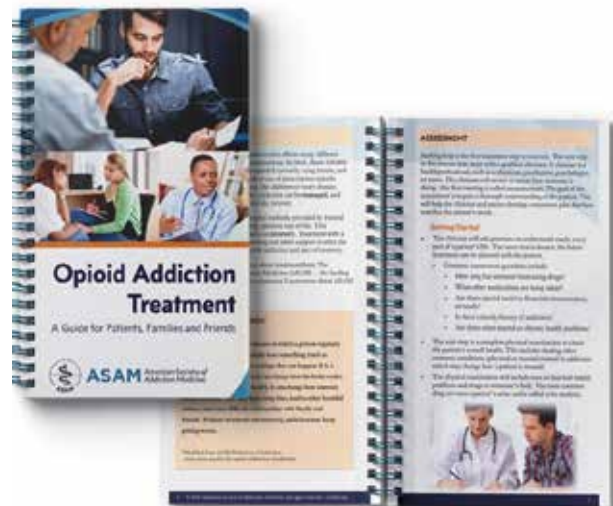

OVERVIEW

Addiction is a chronic brain disease and there are treatments available to help patients.

The ASAM Fundamentals of Addiction Medicine is a practical, case-based workshop designed for physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and all clinicians new to the field of addiction medicine. Participants will learn how to recognize, screen, treat, and/or refer patients with substance use disorders.

The increased interest in expanding the medical care team's role in treating addiction has arisen in part because of the prevalence of medical and psychiatric comorbidities among patients who use substances. As public awareness of addiction and its impact is growing and patient access to medical care is increasing, it is vital that early intervention, treatment, and/or referral begin in primary care, psychiatry, and emergency medicine settings.

EDUCATIONAL PURPOSE

Primary care providers will learn how to effectively identify and treat adult outpatients at risk for or with substance use disorders.

LEARNING FORMAT AND METHODOLOGIES

This live workshop is designed to be energetic and interactive. Attendees will work through session activities and cases presented by faculty with participants at their table. Sessions throughout the day will include approximately one-third lecture, one-third demonstration of skills, and one-third skills building.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon completion, participants should be able to:

1. Identify one's own feelings and attitudes that promote or prevent therapeutic responses to patients with substance use disorders.
2. Demonstrate a knowledge of the diseased brain processes when treating patients with substance use disorders.
3. Use validated patient screening tools to detect substance use and interpret a spectrum of results.
4. Use motivational interviewing to enhance patients' readiness to change risky behaviors.
5. Offer the interventions that are appropriate to specific substances and severity of usage pattern.
 - o Respond to hazardous drinking with brief counseling strategies, appropriate to the patient's readiness to change.
 - o For patients suspected of having a substance use disorder, conduct a biopsychosocial assessment to provide a diagnosis and match the patient to an appropriate level of care.
6. Prescribe pharmacotherapy appropriately for alcohol, tobacco, and opioid use disorders.
7. Offer patients and families information and referral to behavioral interventions including support groups and mutual aid groups that assist in the recovery process.

OVERVIEW

This new workshop on motivational interviewing (MI) focuses on improving conversations about change. Participants are provided with key motivational interviewing skills to promote patient engagement. The spirit of motivational interviewing, as well as how it differs from traditional forms of patient counseling will be covered, with special attention to the first of the four MI processes: engagement. Traps that can lead to disengaged interactions will be discussed, including strategies to avoid these traps. Participants will learn and practice basic MI techniques throughout the training. Emphasis will be given to MI listening skills including open questions, affirmations, reflections, and summaries. Throughout the training, time will be devoted to participant questions, discussion, and skill practice, in addition to brief lectures and video content. Participants will be provided with a Training Journal to use during the session and promote ongoing learning after the session.

EDUCATIONAL PURPOSE

This workshop provides an introduction to motivational interviewing focusing on the first process of MI, engagement, to increase patient motivation and decrease disengagement through knowledge acquisition and skill practice.

LEARNING FORMAT AND METHODOLOGIES

The first half of the course will include mini-lectures on the most skill-practice. The focus is on active skill-practice and participation through questions, discussion, and application. Participants will be provided a Training Journal for use in the training and as an ongoing resource for continued practice and learning.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon completion, participants should be able to:

1. Explain ways in which motivational interviewing differs from traditional ways of communicating about change
2. Explore patient-centered strategies for developing a collaborative working relationship
3. Discuss traps that lead to disengaged interactions
4. Practice using the core interviewing skills of MI to promote patient engagement

OVERVIEW

Pain, Addiction, and Opioids – There and Back Again.

In the past couple of years, research and clinical guidelines for treating patients with pain and/or addiction have evolved dramatically, challenging the traditional way providers think about pain and addiction. 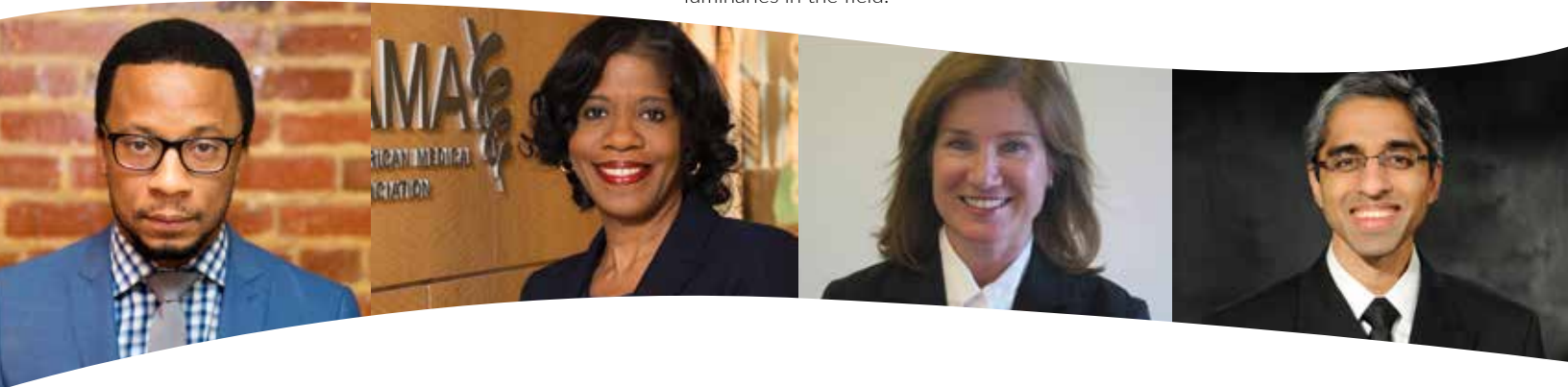

A Beacon of Hope: There Are No Lost Causes

As a spoken word artist, motivational speaker, and activist for the recovery community, Joseph Green uses poetry interwoven with storytelling to share his battle with addiction and subsequent recovery to deliver a message of inspiration to people who have chosen careers in prevention, intervention, and treatment. Using his own story, Joseph reconnects his audience to the source of their motivation, reminding them that, as important as it is to know what we are fighting against, it is more important to remember what we are fighting for.

Sparkling Change: The Providers' Role in Combatting the Opioid Crisis

Prescription opioid misuse, overdose and death continues to be one of our nation's most complex and challenging public health threats. The American Medical Association and its partner organizations on the Task Force to Reduce Opioid Abuse are working to reverse the epidemic through physician leadership. These efforts include urging physicians to use Prescription Drug Monitoring Programs, enhancing physician education, increasing access to treatment for substance use disorders, promoting comprehensive pain care, including non-opioid and non-pharmacologic care, expanding access to the life-saving drug naloxone, and strengthening state Good Samaritan protections for bystanders who intervene to help overdose patients. As chair of the Task Force, and Board Chair at the AMA, Dr. Patrice Harris will examine key data and policy trends at state and national levels, discuss their effectiveness, and highlight specific efforts still needed to reverse the nation's opioid epidemic.

R. Brinkley Smithers Distinguished Scientist Award Winner
Shedding New Light on an Old Problem: Novel Treatments for Alcohol Use Disorder

Recent advances in our understanding of the neurobiology of alcohol use disorder can serve as the basis for the development of novel pharmacotherapies. Specifically, the activation of brain stress systems in early abstinence offers pharmacological targets that can be restored to a homeostatic range of functioning and thereby support recovery. Results from clinical trials of novel medications in this domain will be presented, with implications for clinical practice.

Addiction specialists these days do much more than treat patients. Educating people about addiction and helping them understand the disease from a medical perspective is a ubiquitous request. From giving a Grand Rounds presentation to seasoned attending physicians to training hospital staff through in-service programs to responding to the media, providers are often called on to talk about addiction and its treatments. This session offers an ultra-fast-paced, review of addiction medicine in the context of the current understanding of the addictive process. Despite substantial efforts to encourage adoption of evidence-based practices, the use of medications to treat substance use disorders is still low in both primary care and specialty addiction treatment settings. In this presentation the status of efforts to implement buprenorphine prescribing in primary care and other settings will be described. Barriers to treatment for opioid use disorders and potential strategies to address them such as collaborative care models will be discussed. Successful strategies and lessons learned from efforts to encourage the provision of buprenorphine in specialty and general medical settings will be identified in order to inform future efforts to expand access to medication for opioid use disorder.

Implementing Tobacco-Free Policies in Residential Addiction Treatment Settings

Historically, residential-level SUD treatment centers have allowed patients to continue to use tobacco onsite and have incorporated limited treatment for tobacco dependence into their programs. Beliefs associated with this failure to address tobacco dependence have included: fears that individuals with tobacco use disorders would lose access to viable treatment because they would refuse to abstain; that treatment center census levels and completion rates could decline; or that staff culture would not support such a change. This workshop will present data on how a change in policy had a positive effect on patient admissions and did not reduce access to care for tobacco users. Presenters outline key partnerships, steps followed, and lessons learned during the transition to a tobacco-free environment. Participants will be able to develop action plans for addressing tobacco use disorders within their own treatment settings.

When treating patients with pain or pain and addiction, the practitioner often searches for alternative care strategies, to minimize opioid load and improve function and quality of life. This presentation will discuss some of those alternative care strategies and demonstrate a very powerful therapeutic pathway, with emphasis on pain control, without escalating controlled substances. These interventional techniques are both diagnostic and therapeutic, and assist in an overall strategy of independence from opioid management of pain. These techniques and the promise of new advances in development, lend to an important academic discussion that is timely for those who treat addiction.

Off-Label Pharmacological Approaches to AUD - What's Hot and What's Not?

This workshop will survey off-label approaches to treating alcohol use disorder, such as antidepressants, antipsychotics, anticonvulsants, and anti-anxiety agents. Attendees will identify patients likely to benefit, or not benefit, from an off-label treatment strategy. The rationale for off-label treatment strategies range from treating overt symptoms to returning brain stress systems to within a homeostatic range of functioning following withdrawal. The clinical research literature that supports or does not support various pharmacological treatment strategies will be presented. Discussion is encouraged.

This is cumbersome to use, especially for clinicians who have limited experience with treating withdrawal. Combining Medications with 12-Step, Abstinence-Based Treatment for Opioid Use Disorders

This focus session will describe the combination of use of medications with 12-Step programs in three different settings. The experience of combining these treatment methodologies in an inner city outpatient treatment program will be described. Focus Session



A Low Threshold Clinic for Medically Complex Patients with Substance Use Disorder

Recent Department of Public Health data found that starting pharmacotherapy for opioid use disorder following a non-fatal overdose reduced the risk of death in the subsequent year by more than 50%, yet less than 5% of those who survive overdose begin treatment. Overdose risk increases after periods of reduced tolerance, including hospitalization. Despite the risks, a minority of patients engage in addiction treatment following hospital discharge. This focus session will describe the nuts and bolts of starting and running an immediate access clinic which provides low threshold transitional support and treatment to patients following hospitalization or directly from the emergency department (ED) and other outpatient clinics. Presenters will review lessons learned and discuss early outcomes.

Teamwork Training to Enhance Effectiveness and Patient Safety in Addiction Medicine

Providers from medical, nursing, social work, and administrative personnel must function in effective teams to must provide comprehensive care to patients with multiple and diverse needs. Furthermore, operational inefficiencies increase costs, decrease employee satisfaction, leading to higher employee turn-over and burnout. This session will provide participants with an overview of the literature on pain from opioid use and withdrawal by focusing on three topic areas: opioid-induced hyperalgesia, withdrawal-induced hyperalgesia, and withdrawal-associated injury site pain. Interactive case presentations will be used and participants are encouraged to share their experience.

Thriving Under Value-Based Reimbursement with Behavioral Screening and Intervention (BSI)

As value-based reimbursement continues to expand, healthcare organization leaders increasingly appreciate the importance of behavioral health but aren't sure what to do about it. In this session, attendees will learn how to advise healthcare leaders on Behavioral Screening and Intervention, an evidence-based, cost-saving, proactive approach to identifying and addressing behavioral risks and disorders. BSI includes alcohol and drug SBIRT, tobacco screening and cessation, and collaborative care for mental health disorders. It can be expanded to address adherence to chronic disease treatment regimens. Systematically implementing BSI in a variety of healthcare settings is arguably one of the largest steps a healthcare organization could take toward the triple aim. Use and Interpretation of Buprenorphine Metabolite Profiles During Maintenance Treatment

Effective use of urine drug testing requires not only the right test with appropriate components but also knowledge of the pharmacologic principles of metabolism and elimination. Appropriate testing can reinforce compliance, and deter medication misuse and diversion. Testing during addiction treatment, in buprenorphine maintenance, is part of a primary prevention and disease management program. This session will review buprenorphine metabolism and elimination. Presenters will also discuss the interpretation of drug testing results and appropriate testing frequency. Specific cases involving compliant patients from induction to stabilization are compared to illicit and street use profiles. The session will culminate in an interactive discussion of questions and cases.

Using PMP's and SBIRT to Address Physician Controlled Drug Prescribing

The prudent prescribing of controlled drugs has been a challenge for decades. This is partly due to suboptimal screening for high risk patients by prescribers prior to and during chronic controlled drug prescribing. The development of Prescription Monitoring Programs has brought about the clinical expectation that treatment providers will perform a PMP search on all patients evaluated for problematic substance use. Presenters have implemented a "Reverse – SBIRT" approach to communicate with controlled drug prescribers who appear on substance abusing patient's PMP profiles. This involves using PMP reports to screen for prescribers who are currently prescribing controlled drugs to high risk patients. The Brief Intervention consists of notifying these prescribers of their patients high risk status and the necessity of factoring this information into future prescribing decisions.

Using Project ECHO to Spread Office-Based MAT: Life-Saving System Transformation

Opioid addiction is an increasing problem in the United States. Effective treatment options exist, but are often challenging to access, especially for patients who live in remote, rural areas. Office-based treatment with buprenorphine is an evidence-based approach to helping patients with opioid addiction avoid illicit opioid use and re-engage with a meaningful and productive life. Like many potentially effective treatments, both pharmacological and behavioral, it is essential that the treatment be properly executed to maximize positive outcomes. In this presentation, presenters will review a brief history of the separation of addiction treatment from the medical establishment. Presenters will introduce the Harm Reduction model, and compare how that model fits with traditional treatment models as opposed to with Medication-Assisted Treatment.

Ethical Issues in Addiction Medicine- Case Based Dilemmas

Ethical issues abound in caring for patients with addiction, with clinical dilemmas related to difficult patients, manipulative behavior, refusal of care and legal issues. The workshop will briefly review the ethical principles of autonomy, beneficence, non-maleficence, justice, fidelity and futility. The understanding of these terms will serve as the basis for six patient case discussions. After each brief case presentation, participants will join small groups to discuss and develop an answer (there may not be only one right answer). Participants will have the opportunity to present their own patient care dilemmas that pose ethical questions. The session will validate participants' unease in caring for patients in certain situations and help build clinical confidence, by gaining skills to make decisions in clinical situations using an ethical framework.

Hepatitis C Screening, Education, and Treatment Program for People Who Use Drugs

This workshop will examine unique models of interdisciplinary HCV care delivery tailored to different clinical settings including: primary care, opioid treatment programs, syringe exchanges, and safety net programs for the homeless. After an overview of treatment models, participants will engage in a case-based card game. Each participant will be assigned a specific role (physician, nurse, social worker, pharmacist) and each group will be assigned a patient with clinical characteristics that may complicate treatment paradigms. Then participants will draw cards from a "resource deck" (syringe access program, access to rapid HCV testing with reflex RNA and genotype, MAT access, supportive family, etc.) and a "challenges deck" (lack of knowledge about HCV, stigma, medication prior authorization rejected, patient relapse, lost meds, jailed, Medicaid restrictions, etc). The object of the game is to develop a treatment plan to cure the patient of HCV and reduce ongoing risk.

Integrative Health and Addiction Medicine: Treating the Whole Person

In this interactive workshop, the presenter will introduce integrative addiction medicine by giving a context for this whole person treatment approach, and providing a 'sampler' of clinical approaches that will include: nutrition, mindfulness, supplements, exercise, sleep and CAM case examples. In 2011, the National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP) made a series of resolutions on Medication Assisted Therapy (MAT) requiring court professionals and substance abuse treatment providers to learn about MAT and to obtain expert consultation on the appropriate use of MAT. NADCP forbade blanket prohibitions against the use of MAT for their participants. Despite this, only 44% of courts nationwide are using MAT. Consequently, there are great opportunities for addiction medicine providers to collaborate with local drug courts to deliver high quality MAT services. This presentation will provide an overview of how the state courts are structured, how drug and other specialty court programs work, and strategies for building partnerships between the courts and the medical community.

Overview of Addiction Medicine, 2016-2017: A Rapid Review

Development of a Community-Based Collaboration for a Medical Student Elective for SUD

Drug overdose is a leading cause of accidental death in the US, mainly due to the increased prevalence of opioid abuse. Demand grows for more effective and nuanced addiction treatments, but lack of capacity of healthcare practitioners with addiction knowledge has become apparent. Addiction is a brain disease, often co-occurring with other medical or psychiatric illnesses requiring a comprehensive, ongoing biological, socio-cultural, and psychological approach. But provider attitudes towards drug use are heavily stigmatized and they are disinclined to treat SUD. This disinclination is re-enforced by the lack of addiction training, leaving many providers feeling unprepared to adequately diagnose and treat addiction. Workshop will discuss innovative curricular and clinical approaches to remedy this knowledge gap.

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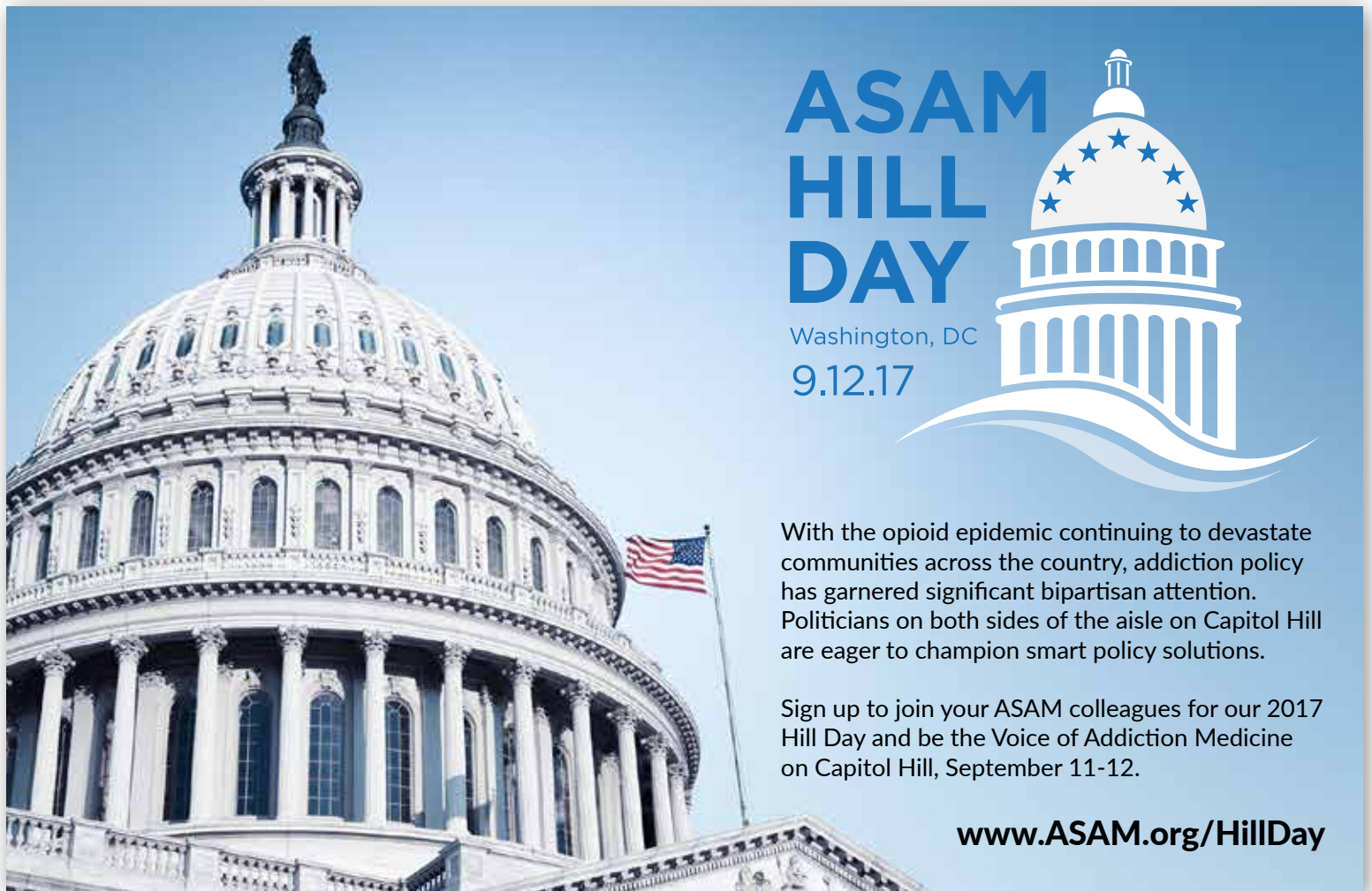

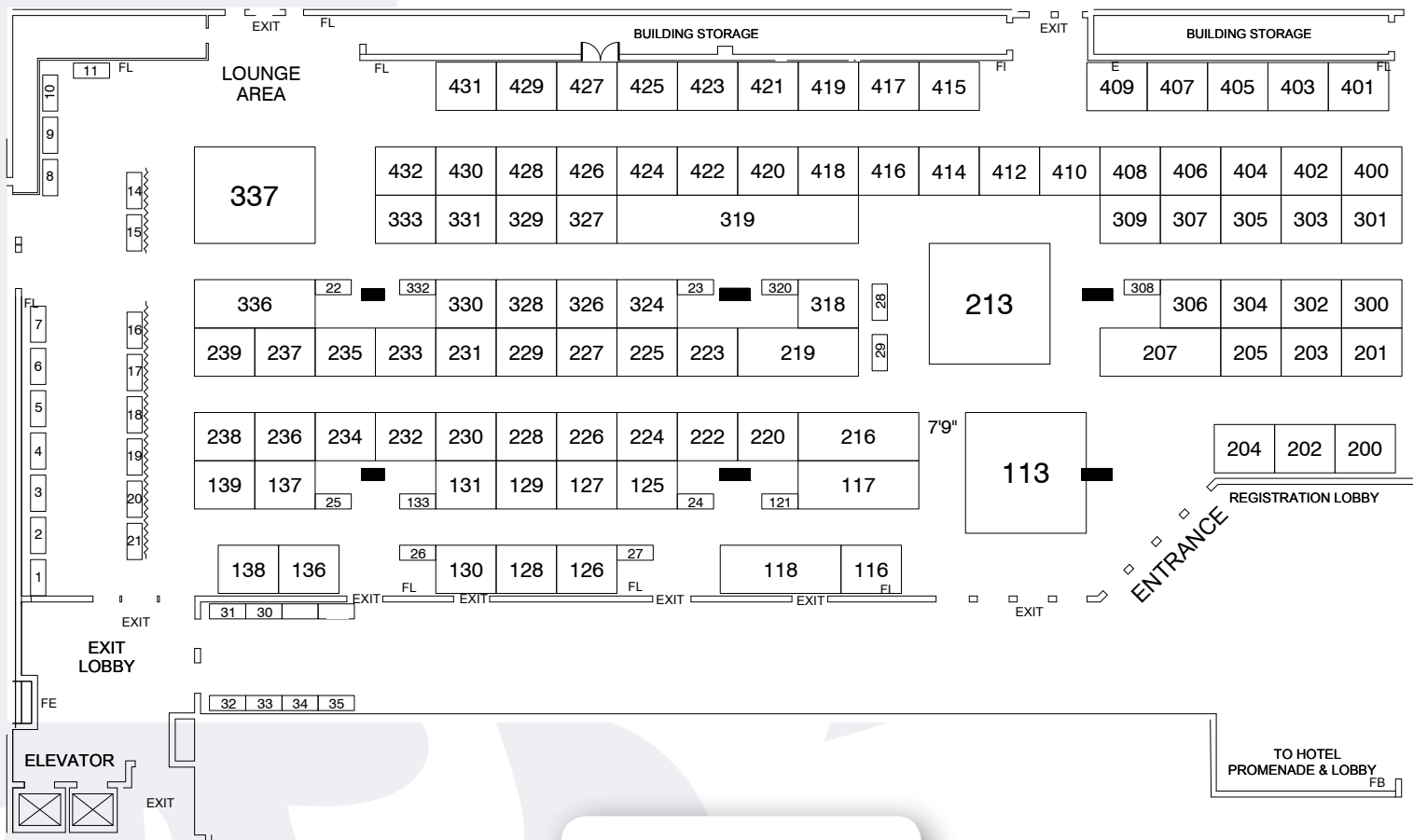

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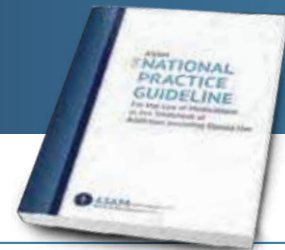
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
